Envision 2050: Clean and Sustainable Transportation Options

On May 18, planning staff from the Northern

Middlesex Council of Governments (NMCOG) held an Environmental Consulting Meeting for the Envision 2050 Long-Range Regional Transportation Plan. The plan will serve as the framework for transportation investments in public transportation, bicycle, pedestrian facilities, highways, bridges, and transportation-related air quality improvements for the region. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) continues the Federal Planning Factors, which are seven national goal areas for the Federal-Aid Highway Program; the fifth goal is to, "protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and state and local planned growth and economic development patterns".

A requirement of this plan is that the Northern Middlesex Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) review and discuss potential mitigation activities to restore and maintain the environmental functions affected by transportation planning, specifically the efforts recommended in our latest plan. During the session Shravanthi Gopalan Narayanan, NMCOG Transportation Planner, provided an overview of the Transportation Improvement Program Highway Projects programmed for funding through 2028 and described projects that will be included in the Recommendations of the Envision 2050 Regional Transportation Plan. Daniela Garcia Moreno, NMCOG Sustainability Planner, provided an overview of the agency's Sustainability Planning efforts highlighting greenhouse gas emission and overall carbon reduction efforts including Net Zero Planning and assistance related to the Massachusetts's Green Communities program, coordinating activities for the Northern Middlesex Stormwater Collaborative, and conducting a wastewater infrastructure study. Audience members highlighted the importance of multidisciplinary planning with respect to transportation as it relates to housing, sustainability, and land use.



2023 Regional Coordinating Council Meeting

The Regional Coordinating Council is a voluntary coalition of transportation providers, planners, human service providers, and advocates who

collaborate to identify and address regional transportation needs. On May 25, the (NMCOG) hosted a 2023 Regional Coordinating Council meeting in partnership with the Merrimack Valley Planning Commission (MVPC) in fulfillment of funding requirements. The session included a presentation from each regional planning agency followed by an open forum discussion including representatives from both regions.

To begin the session Jessica Boulanger, NMCOG Transportation Mobility Specialist, provided a background of the Coordinated Public Transit Human Services Plan, a requirement for federal



transportation funding. This program supports transportation services planned, designed, and carried out to meet the special transportation needs of seniors and individuals with disabilities in all areas. The NMCOG presentation included maps showing the density of persons with disabilities, seniors, and the population growth of our regional senior population from 2011-2022. MVPC staff provided an overview of their region and shared the findings of a preliminary survey. Merrimack Valley Transit Authority shared news of their rebranding and efforts to consolidate paratransit services in the MVPC region under the name Mini Meva. Participants shared creative methods for identifying drivers for volunteer services by visiting college campuses and other key demographics to assist with van rides. Across both regions participants highlighted the need for additional funding and capacity building around funding. Rachel Fichtenbaum of MassDOT referenced state funding opportunities available to our Councils on Aging and Transit Authorities.

Regional Clean Energy Workshop Sustainability Panel and Community Conversation

On May 22nd, NMCOG hosted a Sustainability Panel and Community Workshop. A part of NMCOG's Regional Clean Energy Workshop Series, this workshop featured a panel conversation with Sue Thomas, Town of Westford's Sustainability Coordinator; Badhri Uppiliappan, Town of Chelmsford's Clean Energy and Sustainability Committee Chair; and Terumi Okano, Town of Pepperell's Climate Change Committee Co-Chair. The workshop included a presentation from consultant, John Snell, who shared lessons learned from his work with Merrimack Valley Planning Commission and Metropolitan Area Planning Council communities. Special Joint Stormwater Collaborative Meeting: PFAS

On May 24th, NMCOG hosted a Special Joint Stormwater Collaborative Meeting with the Merrimack Valley Planning Commission to learn about polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFSA), an emergent contaminant that is a threat to communities and their health worldwide. Members of the Northern Middlesex Stormwater Collaborative and the Merrimack Valley Stormwater Collaborative heard from Massachusetts Municipal Association Legislative Analyst, Josie Ahlberg, who gave an overview of State and Federal regulations related to PFAS and provided strategies for municipalities to take action on this critical issue.
